Greetings everyone

We thought we ought to bring you all up to date with decisions made by the Chaplaincy Council at their meeting on 20th January. It was a harmonious meeting and good to have Church Warden Amanda with us after her prolonged stay in England caring for her poorly mother.

Here are some things that were noted or agreed.

- The Archdeacon has agreed that a new chaplain should be sought and hopefully be in post by September 2019, probably on a "house for duty" basis.
- The present interim chaplains Revs Stephen and Sue Goodwin have agreed to stay until the end of July 2019 (Brexit permitting).
- Both Church Wardens Amanda and Janet, and the Treasurer Michael are stepping down. They have done sterling work in keeping the Chaplaincy going through various inter-regna. We pray that suitable candidates will be prepared to step up to these roles.
- Our accounts are probably better than had been anticipated in the budget for 2018. These will be presented at the Council meeting on 17th February.
- The Council agreed to rotate the venues for their meetings so that one meeting each year would be held in the Luberon and one in Aix-en-Provence.
- A new Electoral Roll has to be compiled this year and application forms will be available in the next couple of weeks with additional information on them about what it means to be on the Roll. Completed forms need to be in by 10th March.
- Roxana will be ordained deacon this summer and the PCC are updating the Task List especially as Roxana does so much behind the scenes (as do many others). So we will be looking for volunteers to fill the gaps!
- It was agreed that we need to review our mission with seafarers and how we may support them, especially in light of the changing way modern cruise liners work today.
- It was agreed to buy 20 pew Bibles (English language NIV) for All Saints and Rev John Smith offered to source funding for this.
- Easter Sunday is on 21 April this year and it was suggested that the Aix and Luberon congregations be asked to join with All Saints at Marseille on that Sunday. Details later.
- A BBQ in the Luberon is proposed for Sunday 12th May in order to raise funds for the Chaplaincy. Tickets will be on sale in due course.

As you can see there is a lot for which to be thankful and much to pray for. We thank God that He is faithful and we ask Him to increase our faith to cope with the challenges ahead of us all.

LENT NEWSLETTER MARCH 2019

Greetings everyone

On 6th March, Ash Wednesday, we enter the penitential season of Lent and we begin the journey towards Holy Week and Easter (21st April). We mark the start with a special service, a solemn Eucharist with the imposition of ashes. The Common Worship Prayer Book says this about Lent.

"Lent may originally have followed Epiphany, just as Jesus' sojourn in the wilderness followed immediately on his baptism, but it soon became firmly attached to Easter, as the principal occasion for baptism and for the reconciliation of those who had been excluded from the Church's fellowship for apostasy or serious faults. This history explains the characteristic notes of Lent – self-examination, penitence, self-denial, study, and preparation for Easter, to which almsgiving has traditionally been added.

Now is the healing time decreed for sins of heart and word and deed, when we in humble fear record the wrong that we have done the Lord. (Latin, before 12th century)

As the candidates for baptism were instructed in Christian faith, and as penitents prepared themselves, through fasting and penance, to be readmitted to communion, the whole Christian community was invited to join them in the process of study and repentance, the extension of which over forty days would remind them of the forty days that Jesus spent in the wilderness, being tested by Satan."

Traditionally people have been encouraged to give something up for Lent perhaps abstaining from rich food or alcohol the practice of self-denial being good for the soul as well as the body!? In more recent times people have been encouraged to do something positive such as a daily act of kindness. This year the Archbishop of Canterbury has invited us to give up cynicism for Lent! However you choose to observe Lent I would suggest setting aside more time to read your bible and pray. We will be writing weekly reflections on the Cross during Lent which will go on our church website and our Facebook page. Copies will be available in church too but if you would like an email copy please let us know.

At the beginning of April we have our Chaplaincy AGM, which is particularly important this year. Not only is this when we appoint a new Chaplaincy Council, but this year both churchwardens and our Treasurer are all stepping down to focus on their families and work. All three, Amanda, Janet and Michael, have served the chaplaincy well and will be hard to replace. An outline of the duties of Chaplaincy Council members, Churchwardens and Treasurer are given below. Do have a look and see if God may be calling you to any of those tasks, through which you can serve – and have a say in – the life of the chaplaincy. ELECTORAL ROLL

We have been making a new Electoral Roll and to have a say in the ministry and mission of the Chaplaincy you need to be on the roll. The deadline for signing up is Sunday 10th March so please grab a form and fill it in and return it to church or a Chaplain as soon as possible. Thank you.

WHAT CAN YOU OFFER THE CHAPLAINCY?

Our congregations are full of many gifted people with a multitude of life skills and professional expertise. We all have something to offer, whether it is a gift for flower arranging, experience in management, running our own business, or hosting social events. Please do consider taking on one of these roles.

The **Chaplaincy Council** meets 4-6 times a year, after a Sunday service, and discusses and makes decisions about chaplaincy life. The CC recently resolved to rotate the meetings around the congregations, with at least one meeting a year to be held in Aix and another in the Luberon. The CC comprises Wardens, Secretary, Treasurer, Safeguarding Officer, Aix Representative, Luberon Representative and Archdeaconry Synod Reps, as well as other lay congregation members who each contribute in their own way.

Essential requirements: A firm commitment to attend meetings, ability to speak and understand English well enough to participate in the discussion and voting, a willingness to further and nourish the life of our three congregations.

The **Churchwardens** are essential to the functioning of the chaplaincy, and are answerable not to the chaplain but to the Bishop of Gibraltar (Diocese in Europe) through his intermediary the Archdeacon of France. They are thus considered the leading lay members of the congregation, and are responsible for the day-to-day functioning of the whole chaplaincy, not just the maintenance of buildings, contents, contracts for usage of other worship venues, insurances, clergy accommodation etc, but also ensuring the smooth running of the church services, events, personnel etc. A general description of their duties can be found at <u>http://www.churchwardens.com/duties.html</u>, while terms specific to the Diocese in Europe are given at <u>https://europe.anglican.org/diocesan-policies-and-guidelines/the-lay-officers-of-the-church</u>

Please note that Churchwardens, while having the responsibility for the good functioning of the Chaplaincy, can delegate many of the tasks to others in the Chaplaincy.

Essential requirements: Faith, management skills, people skills, energy, willingness to work as part of a team, ability to communicate well in both French and English.

The **Treasurer** is of course responsible for the chaplaincy finances, including banking cash and cheques, paying bills, ensuring insurances etc are in place, accounting, filing returns to Diocese, providing regular financial reports to Chaplaincy Council.

Essential requirements: Secure grasp of financial matters, accounting practices, French law regarding associations cultuelles, tax requirements etc. And of course honesty!

NB The outgoing officers will be available to support their successors during the transition period.

The Revd Jamie Johnston



Jamie was born in Kent and later moved to Salisbury in Wiltshire, where he attended the cathedral and developed a love of Anglican worship and choral music.

After studying modern languages at Oxford, he trained as a solicitor and worked for law firms in London and Paris, followed by a year with the European Court of Human Rights in Strasbourg. On returning to London he spent the next twenty years advising on wills and probate, particularly assisting clients who had family in both France and the UK. He is a fluent French speaker.

As a grandson and great-grandson of Anglican clergy, the church has always been part of his life, in city and rural parishes. In 1998 he joined the congregation of St Martin-in-the-Fields when they were embarking on a project to restore and develop their buildings. The impact of his involvement with St Martin's, including its outreach to homeless and vulnerable people and its care for those struggling with the pressures of 21st century city life, resulted in Jamie responding to a long-sensed call to ordination. He studied theology at St Mellitus College in London and was ordained in 2016, at which point he retired from legal work to take up a curacy at St Matthew's Westminster and St Mary le Strand.

Since studying French at university Jamie has spent most of his spare time in France. He is delighted to be joining the chaplaincy and is looking forward to getting to know the congregations.

Advent

As the days shorten, our thoughts turn once more towards Advent and the approach of Christmas. Advent is a time of watching and waiting for the coming of Christ in the incarnation, culminating in the joy of Christmas. It also looks ahead to the final advent of Christ as judge at the end of time. Some churches emphasise Advent as a time of prayer and fasting, not unlike Lent. This can be part of a general interest in rediscovering the practices of the early church. Nowadays, though, a message of abstinence in Advent is apt to make even devout churchgoers feel uncomfortable. Should they not take part in their child's end of term Christmas celebrations on the ground that they are happening too early? Should they boycott their employer's pre-Christmas festivities because, if the early church didn't indulge in them, neither should they? Are they not to accept offers of mulled wine and mince pies before 25th December? Or do they do all of the above and just feel guilty? This sort of dual pressure – of the church on the one hand proclaiming a discipline that feels almost impossible to keep (unless one has no family, friends, gainful activity or time pressure!) and, on the other hand, the lived experience of twenty-first century Christians – can sometimes leave people with a feeling of failure as they approach Christmas.

The real emphasis of Advent is on expectation rather than penitence. Even so, before I was ordained, I often found myself struggling with the church's assumptions about the amount of time its members had available during this season. If you are juggling multiple responsibilities and pressures, one way to approach Advent from a spiritual point of view can be to focus on its central symbol: the conquering of darkness by light. Why not spend some time each week this December in front of a lighted candle, reflecting on the ways in which darkness in your life has been dispelled by light, of how you might do something to dispel the darkness for others, and of how the light of Christ's coming makes the difference? I offer it as a suggestion to those who feel they have no time to 'do Advent properly'. And if in the end all you can see are crowded streets, a city overrun with extra people for whom there doesn't seem to be any room, then pause for a moment and look for Christ there. For that is where incarnation begins.

Almighty God,

give us grace to cast away the works of darkness and to put on the armour of light, now in the time of this mortal life, in which your Son Jesus Christ came to us in great humility; that on the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious majesty to judge the living and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal; through him who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

Christmas

Recently I was asked what difference I thought Christmas makes. It occurred to me that one difference is that it helps us reconnect with what matters most. For some that means family. For others it means goodwill, the generosity of spirit often encountered at this time of the year. For others it means meeting those we don't usually meet - relatives or friends we see only rarely but who are part of a Christmas tradition, without whom it wouldn't be the same.

Yet for every family happily reassembling around a Christmas table, there are others for whom there will be little joy. Any number of things can make this time of year feel bleak and alienating - bereavement, illness, loss of relationship, work or home, or simply the grinding struggle to make ends meet. Some Christmases are endured rather than enjoyed and, as always, our hearts are with those for whom this year will be especially hard.

One thing that unites us in our joys and struggles is the assurance that, however little we may understand it, somehow we matter to God. So much so that in love God came among us, suffered, died and rose for us, is with us now in Spirit and will be with us until the end of time. That's what makes the difference.

For many of us, last week's General Election result in the UK brings the prospect of Brexit uncomfortably close. The New Year will bring apprehension and, for some, life-changing decisions. The message which sounds insistently through the Christmas Gospel, which we hear each time the story of our redemption is retold, is 'Fear not'. It will be a good message to take with us into the New Year and to hold close in the months ahead.

What matters most is love. As the Letter of John reminds us, perfect love casts out fear. Perfect love was revealed in Bethlehem, incarnate in a manger.

May I wish all of you a blessed and peaceful Christmas, and a hopeful New Year.

Almighty God, you have given us your only-begotten Son to take our nature upon him and as at this time to be born of a pure virgin: grant that we, who have been born again and made your children by adoption and grace, may daily be renewed by your Holy Spirit; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

Ecumenism at ground level

For well over 40 years we Anglicans have been made welcome at Roman Catholic worship in France. Knowing that many of us find ourselves far from our nearest Anglican church, they have been more than happy to see us join them. Since our arrival in a tiny 'village perché' in the Grand Luberon, David and I have been happy to continue worshipping at Marseille, Aix and Oppède, but there are weeks when we stay at home and worship locally.

Like many small villages, ours sees only occasional services these days: clergy find themselves spread very thinly! But we are blessed with being only a few minutes away from a very special community where there is Sunday worship every week. Founded by Franciscan sisters many years ago, Berdine is a community which lives and breathes practical Christian service. People who have lost their way in life – whether through alcohol, drugs or a time living on the streets - make a positive choice. They come to Berdine to be a part of the community, renouncing any previous addictions. Living a simple life far away from malign influences, they become part of a working community, in the process rediscovering a sense of self-worth.

We have been privileged to worship with those who live in or support Berdine for ten years now, but sadly at the end of the summer their priest, Jean-Michel left us. One of the Petits Frères, he was a truly wonderful man, at the heart of the community and its spiritual strength. He is sadly missed by all, not least because as yet the local Catholic church is unable to offer a priest to lead Sunday worship. Our friends at Berdine have therefore invited us to lead Anglican Holy Communion services on the Sundays when we're not leading worship with our own congregations. Our Archdeacon is happy with the arrangement and we feel it's important to offer them our support at this difficult time. Jean-Michel's big shoes will take some filling, but please pray for the wonderful work of this community and that soon God will send a new leading light to support them as they expand their priceless work.
